Sharing at a Church Planters Gathering

Right after Ryan attended the NAE board meeting in DC, he flew to Boca Roton, Florida to attend a church planters gathering at a church in this area. This church invests significant resources into church planting, and Ryan was asked to be a part of a panel discussion on the main stage at this gathering. Ryan shared about discipleship in a First Peoples in North America ministry context. A number of leaders approached him afterward to thank Ryan for sharing what he did at this gathering of church planters from various parts of the world. The FPI is focused on raising up church planters as it is, arguably, the best way to see people reached for Christ.


From a Missions Field to a Missions Force

A part of our vision related to First Peoples ministry involves raising up tribal people to be a global missions force rather than only being active in ministry to other tribal people. While our focus is on ministering to tribal people in North America, we also don't want to completely overlook ministry to other people groups as God leads. One way to accomplish our mission of raising up tribal people to be a missions force is by being an example of a couple who are also taking some time to minister to all people as God leads. This past quarter, Ryan, in particular, had a number of opportunities to be present with people in their time of need/loss. For example, Ryan was informed of a man who had choked and suffered a heart attack. This man and his wife have been friends of ours for years. As a result, Ryan drove from Bemidji to Abbott Northwestern in Minneapolis to visit this man and his family. After visiting him and the family and praying for them, Ryan left the hospital and this man died later in the afternoon after Ryan visited him. The next week, Ryan led the funeral for this man. It was an emotional time for both of us as we care deeply for this couple. Much of ministry involves being with people and caring about them in their time of need.

Showing Love and Care for Tribal People in Their Time of Need

Ryan is a part of a small committee that is planning a Christian hockey camp in August of this summer at the Piikani Reserve in Alberta. The pastor of the church on this reserve had a step son who passed away recently as well. The family of this pastor on this reserve are huge Calgary Flames fans, the professional hockey team Ryan was drafted by. As a result, Ryan was asked if he could put together a short video and to share some words of encouragement, comfort, and hope that could be shown during the funeral. Ryan put together about a five minute video and shared from Rev. 21 in this video. The family was very thankful to Ryan for sharing what he did in the video and the pastor asked if Ryan would be willing to come up and preach God's word before this Christian hockey camp this summer. Ryan said he would be willing to come as this pastor stressed that the people on this reserve need to be taught God's word. Equipping Missionaries to Living Courageously for the Lord

In November, Ryan and our oldest son, Joshua, travelled to Florianopolis, Brazil to attend a gathering of missionaries and for Ryan to share/speak God's word at this gathering. Joshua wanted to go with, attend the missions gathering himself, and to go surfing during some of our free time as he had never surfed before and he has wanted to learn how for quite some time.

While we had some challenging flight dynamics both on our flight down to Brazil and on our return trip, we made it safely to Brazil and got back home safely as well. Ryan was asked to speak on the topic of living courageously for the Lord, and he shared about courage from the life of King David. More specifically, Ryan shared about 1) living courageously based upon God's past faithfulness. David had courage to face Goliath because God had already delivered David from a lion and a bear. 2) living courageously based upon God's truth in the present. David focused on God's truth in the present to be able to face Goliath. For example, he had full confidence in the Lord and what God could do when he faced Goliath. 3) Ryan talked about living courageously based upon receiving a future reward. The Lord will one day give us eternal rewards for our faithfulness here on earth, including how we took courageous steps of obedience to do what the Lord has called us to do. Ryan's message was well-received.

Joshua also loved learning how to surf during some of our downtime, and Ryan and Josh had a great father/son time together on this trip to Brazil. It's important to remember that ministry starts with our family, and while no family is perfect as there is only one perfect person (Jesus) God does call us as Christ followers to make family a high priority and to work at having our families in order. Part of that includes spending quality time with our kids.

After the Minnesota Prayer Breakfast, this group of Native American ministry leaders visited a Christian community development corporation in south Minneapolis to learn more about their work and mission. We ended the time together having lunch in south Minneapolis and discussing a variety of Native ministry topics. It was a very enriching and encouraging morning.
